Beware St. Paul!

There's a side of St. Paul that few people know about. When I started studying Scripture, I was surprised to learn this about . It turns out, Paul was what we would call today a fund-raiser.

As you know, Paul was a kind of traveling salesman for early Christianity. But the situation he faced was interesting. It was the early 50's AD. Headquarters, at the time, was in Jerusalem. There was tension on many levels between what Paul was doing in the field and the interests of the Jerusalem authorities. (Not the last time this kind of conflict has arisen in our Church.) Many attempts were made at the time and in later Christian tradition to downplay and cover-up this early controversy, but we know that at times it could become heated, if not bitter. Paul found something that could break through the partisan feelings.

The economy in Jerusalem had collapsed, at least as far as the Christians huddled together there were concerned. Maybe it was the outbreak of a famine caused by some epidemic. Or maybe it was an outbreak of anti-Christian persecution. We don't know. Whatever the cause, the Church in Jerusalem turned for help to the other Churches and that of course involved Paul who was the primary builder of the gentile communities outside of Jerusalem. So, Paul made a strenuous effort to raise money for the beleaguered Church in Jerusalem. But why should Greek gentiles in southern Turkey or northern Greece care about Jews in Jerusalem? For that matter, why should Paul himself care, given how he had been treated? But Paul saw not an obstacle, but an opportunity.

I often think of St Paul's fund-raising abilities when I'm asked by the bishop to raise money for some Archdiocesan collection, in this case, Catholic Charities. (Yeah, that's what this is about!) Well, you can say, Walter Modrys is no St. Paul! True enough. But the situation does have some parallels. Relations aren't always perfectly smooth between the field outposts and headquarters. And the needs of people who are asking for help are undeniable, just like the situation Paul faced. But what's our connection to them?

So, I checked out Chapters 8 and 9 of his Second Letter to the Corinthians, where Paul puts on his fund-raising hat. He starts off saying how the Macedonians, who are rather poor, have given more than you Corinthians could ever dream of. Not a good tactic, invoking guilt, but Paul does it gently. He tells the Corinthians to just give a moderate amount. Here in the Archdiocese, they want to raise 12.5 million dollars, and our assigned parish goal is thirty-eight thousand dollars. That's just 0.3% of the goal, so there must be a lot of other parishes who are contributing more than we are.

Then Paul insists he has put good people in charge of the collection and everything is on the up and up. You'll have to make a judgment about the integrity of Catholic Charities. From what I know there are a lot of poor people

who have been greatly assisted by the people who work with Catholic Charities. Paul would use that to his advantage.

Then Paul plays on their pride. I have been boasting all over Macedonia, he says to the Corinthians, about your enthusiastic generosity. No Corinthian in good standing wanted to make Paul look bad, so Paul was clearly using his leverage. I don't know what the Archdiocese does with underperforming pastors, so we'll pass over that point. Not much leverage!

But then Paul moves on to close the deal. He puts the whole transaction in terms of our relationship with the Lord. If you sow sparsely, you will reap sparsely, too. That's the way God treats us, Paul argues. And when you give whatever you've decided, give cheerfully. Then God will take care of your needs, but only if you have done your share to take care of the needs of others. That's the way God works. The help you give, Paul says, not only satisfies the needs of God's holy people, but leads to widespread thanksgiving to God, because the people you help will give glory to God when they think of you.

Leave it to Paul to find some profound religious insight into something we so easily overlook. It's all about how God looks upon all of us together as his people and wants us all bonded together across all the lines that divide us: race, class, ethnic identity, economic standing, etc. Hey, just take care of one another, seems to be Paul's ultimate message, so that the Lord will take care of you.

Just to prove my point about Paul's fund-raising skills, he talked me and the other Jesuits at Old St Joe's into kicking in \$1,000 to the Catholic Charities collection. There are envelopes in the back of the Church if you find you, too, can't resist giving something. And if you're a registered parishioner, you should have gotten something in the mail. Imagine if Paul had had access to the internet!
