## An Afternoon with Fr. Bill Byron SJ

A group of 30 came together on Saturday, October 20 to cap off OSJ's sixth annual One Book, One Parish series. This half day retreat started with the 12:05 PM Mass, which was concelebrated by Fr. Modrys and Fr. William Byron SJ. Among his many accomplishments, Fr. Byron is the author of this year's book selection, *A Book of Quiet Prayer*.

Fr. Byron, the homilist at Mass, gave those in attendance much to consider, especially from the first reading, St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Fr. Byron drew our attention to the part of the passage that says:

*May the eyes of your heart be enlightened,  
that you may know what is the hope  
that belongs to his call. (Ephesians 1:18)*

Fr. Byron invited us to see the world through the heart, not just the head. He explained that the hope of which St. Paul speaks comes from gratitude. He spoke about the eyes of our hearts and gratitude in greater depth during our afternoon retreat.

After lunch Fr. Byron began by sharing his path to being called to be a Jesuit. He attended St. Joseph's Prep and graduated in 1945, and like most young men of his time, was drafted and sent to fight in World War II. (Fr. Byron noted that his experience as a paratrooper in Frankfurt, Germany left him with a rare accomplishment: the first seven times he went up in an airplane, he did not land inside the plane he took off in!) After the war he returned to Philadelphia, and with the help of the GI Bill, began to study physics at Drexel. Drawn more toward liberal arts, he moved over to St. Joseph's University and completed his undergraduate degree. As he considered what to do with that degree, Fr. Byron

remembered the desperate poverty he saw in post-war Germany. He felt called to help those in need, and he responded to the call by entering the Society of Jesus.

As a young Jesuit, Fr. Byron learned to pray in a different way. His first thirty-day retreat with the Spiritual Exercises taught him the importance of allowing God to speak to him and hear God's word in his life. He also learned about the importance of directing his desires so that they led to choosing those things that are more conducive (the 'magis') towards the end for which we are created.

How does one do this in the midst of a busy life? Fr. Byron encouraged us to spend time in quiet prayer, listening to how God moves us, not just in the heart, but more importantly in the gut. This is a technique that St. Ignatius of Loyola developed during his long recovery from his battle wounds. By truly listening with our inner ear, our gut, we discern how God is moving us and encouraging us to explore more than what we might think is possible. On this point, Fr. Byron offered the sage advice: "If your head says go and your gut says no, then don't go forward. However, if your head says no and your gut says go, then give it a try!"

Fr. Byron then returned to the theme of gratitude that he began during his homily. Quoting his *Book of Quiet Prayer*, Fr. Byron said that if he were pressed to reduce the entire meaning of religion into one word, it would be gratitude. Since God first loved us, we are able

to love, and we are grateful for that love. Fr. Byron also quoted G.K. Chesterton's observation that "thanks are the highest form of thought; and gratitude is happiness doubled by wonder." Fr. Byron explained this magnification principle as "a multiplier effect associated with gratitude, and the wonder of it all is that gratitude can, if you let it stretch your mind, magnify your happiness."

But, as Fr. Byron went on to explain, success does not always lead to gratitude. The human spirit has a way of turning success into ingratitude, perhaps because we become self-absorbed with success instead of remaining outward looking and outward giving. We can curb this move towards selfishness by continuing to keep our focus on generous sharing. We know that we are on the right track if we are moved to do the right thing in our choices not because we will be rewarded for doing so, but simply because we desire always

to do the right thing.

Fr. Byron concluded by teaching us a new word, one that exemplifies a way of living our lives to the fullest, the more, the magis. That word is *humbition*. *Humbition* is the crossroads of humility and ambition. It seeks to be competent, generous, outward looking. It does not seek the spotlight for good works but is filled with gratitude for being able to make a difference.

Everyone who spent last Saturday afternoon with Fr. Byron was certainly grateful for the generous gifts of insight that were so clearly the fruit of his long life of prayer. And Fr. Byron left us with two parting gifts, that is, two suggestions for further reading: what he called 'the second half' of *A Book of Quiet Prayer*, which is *Praying with and for Others*, and his latest book, *Growing Old Gratefully*.

### When I Was Hungry

On Sunday, **November 4 at 1:00 PM** in Barbelin Hall, Old St. Joseph's welcomes back Mr. Richard Massaro, director of the Ignatian Volunteer Corps for the Philadelphia/South Jersey region. Mr. Massaro will bring his backgrounds in theology and economic development to address "*When I Was Hungry: Food Insecurity, Catholic Social Teaching and our Preferential Option for the Poor*". Here is his preview:

"The joy and hope, the grief and anguish of the people of our time, especially of those who are poor or afflicted in any way, are the joy and hope, the grief and anguish of the followers of Christ as well."

These first words of Vatican Council II's Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World were proclaimed more than fifty years ago and remain the core of being authentic Christian disciples. The Council urged the entire Church to make a preferential option for the poor. This option is actually an imperative, a mandate to consciously and deliberately make a wholehearted choice to attend to those who are most in need

We will look at the grief and anguish of people who don't know if, when or how they will find adequate nutrition for themselves and their families. We will examine and discuss causes of chronic food insecurity around the world and especially in our own area. We will then talk about effective ways to help people meet immediate needs and be able to provide for themselves.
