Come, Lord Jesus!

When I was a young boy, each Fall was filled with great excitement and anticipation as I waited for the annual arrival of the Sears & Roebuck Christmas Catalogue. And each year that watching and waiting was always rewarded with page after page of the latest toys, the fanciest decorations, and, in the mind of a little boy, the coolest clothes. Hours were spent poring over the pages of that catalogue, totally enchanted with all that was being offered.

That sense of excited anticipation is at the heart of Advent. It has been said that Christians live in the "in between time", that time between the inauguration of God's kingdom through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus and the full establishment of that kingdom with the Lord's return in glory. The celebration of Advent reminds us that we are a people who wait.

From its very beginnings, the Church was mindful of the Lord's promise to return in glory and usher in the full establishment of God's Kingdom. In fact, reading St. Paul's letters, we find that the Lord's return was considered to be rather imminent. Paul is continually admonishing his people to be prepared and to live lives worthy of the call they have received as Christians, ready for the Lord's return. Our celebration of Advent draws our attention to these end times. The Scriptures for the first half of Advent speak of God's mercy and justice. We hear of the promises made to Israel and how God is faithful to those promises. We hear of restoration, of homecoming, of the call for us to be

faithful, of the glory to be revealed. In short, we hear of hope, a hope that removes all fear because we hear how our God loves us and wants us to share his very life with us. Advent reminds us of our final destiny as a people and the immense mercy of God.

However, in the middle of Advent, on December 17, there is a shift in focus. Now we are in direct preparation for the celebration of the Lord's birth.

When the Church began to commemorate the Lord's Nativity (in approximately the 4th century), the celebration of Christmas was intimately connected to the Paschal Mystery. Jesus' birth as a



human being was seen as the first stage in the Lord's victory over sin and death that took place in his Passion, Death, and

Resurrection, thus bringing about our salvation. With an emphasis on this central core of our belief, it seemed appropriate to encourage a preparation period for such a feast. Thus, Advent invites us to reflect on the mystery of the Lord's coming among us in the flesh. This period of preparation has somewhat of a penitential character to it (purple vestments, simple altar decorations, etc.), and an equally anticipatory

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focus where we deny ourselves certain things (e.g., the Gloria at Mass) so that our joy is magnified when we resume them on the Feast of Christmas. In short, Advent is about the two comings of Christ: in the flesh at Bethlehem and in glory at the end of time. We are a people who look to the past with gratitude, to the future in hope, while we stand in the present working for the coming of the Kingdom in the here and now.

But there is a third coming of Christ we celebrate in Advent.

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153), in meditating on John 14:23 (“Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him”), speaks of a third coming, Christ coming into our hearts. According to St. Bernard, those who embrace the Word of God and let it embrace their very being find in that Word a way to live between the two comings of Christ mentioned above. Meditating on God’s Word and taking it to heart gives us a way of proceeding in living our lives as disciples of the Lord. Advent, then, is a privileged time to meditate on the Word of God, take it into our hearts, and let it animate all our actions as we wait for the Lord’s return.

The model Advent provides for this embracing of the Word of God is Mary, the mother of Jesus. As a woman formed in the Hebrew Scriptures, Mary learned of the awesomeness of God, of God’s promises to Israel, of Israel’s continual failure to keep the covenant and God’s boundless mercy. Most importantly, Mary knew of God’s promise to Israel to send a Savior who will usher in God’s Kingdom, re-creating our world according to God’s mercy and justice. Mary trusted in God’s Word. It was this trust, even when things seemed impossible, that enabled her to say, “Yes” to God’s invitation to be the Mother of the Word made Flesh, Jesus.

With Mary as our example, this Advent we pray for the grace to let the Word of God fill our hearts and minds. We ask that our love for God, our brothers and sisters, and all of creation, deepen. We pray: Come Lord Jesus!

Offering of Letter Follow Up

Have you received a non-answer from your Congressional representatives? For example, Senator Toomey's five-paragraph response to a letter about the positive impact of SNAP in Philadelphia, where nearly 20% of the population is food-insecure, contained only a single sentence complaining that his amendments to "stop food stamp fraud" were not voted on.

If you've received a similar letter, consider writing back! Bread for the World offers the following suggestions for follow-up letters. The boldface is what you might hear from your legislator; the italics are your possible responses: **Benefit cuts and eligibility changes to SNAP in the farm bill are necessary "to maintain the integrity of the program."**

- *SNAP is already an effective and efficient program that reaches exactly whom it's supposed to. The average SNAP household has a gross monthly income of \$813, well below the strict national income limits. Ninety-two percent of SNAP benefits go to households with incomes at or below the poverty line, which is \$25,100 for a family of four.*
- *Nearly two-thirds of all SNAP benefits go to the most vulnerable—children, elderly, or disabled people. In fact, roughly 1.5 million veterans live in households that participated in SNAP at some point during the past 12 months, and about 8 percent of all veterans received SNAP.*

Stricter work requirements in SNAP are necessary to get participants "back to work."

- *SNAP already encourages work. Employment rates among households with children and at least one non-disabled adult rose nearly 10 percent from 2009 to 2015 during the Great Recession. Additionally, the majority of able-bodied adults who receive SNAP are already working or looking for work.*
- *The House Farm Bill would shift funding from food assistance to the administrative costs of job requirements and mandatory classes for people who lose assistance and cannot find work. The funding that the bill would provide for "job training" cannot possibly provide meaningful training for the millions of people who would be negatively affected by its stricter job requirements.*

Gesu School has asked for warm hats and gloves and picture books for each of its Pre-K-grade 2 students. Books are an especially meaningful gift in Philadelphia, which is a book desert. According to Unite for Literacy, fewer than 10% of homes in Philadelphia county own more than 100 books. Picture books provide a strong foundation for emerging readers by building vocabulary and developing story sense. The best picture books offer both mirrors of a child's experience and a window onto the wider world. Want help in finding a great read for someone 4-8 years old? Search online for the American Library Association's Caldecott Medal and Honor books from 1938 to the present. The websites of the Cooperative Children's Book Center and We Need Diverse Books also feature resources with hyperlinks to award-winning books in many categories.

The Aquinas Center has requested gifts to help two newly-welcomed immigrant families furnish their kitchens, prepare for winter, and send children well-equipped to school. By also requesting gift cards to local stores frequented by South Philadelphia families, the Aquinas Center seeks to respect the families' discretion on how best to meet their basic needs.
