
Round and Round We Go

My grade-school music teacher often had my class sing rounds. I loved hearing us sing overlapping parts of the song at the same time. Today I think of the annual passage of time as a round. We live in multiple years simultaneously, each beginning at a different moment. There's the calendar year, the fiscal year, the academic year, and the liturgical year; you may even have others. Each year has its new beginning yet is also embedded in the movement of the others so that the years sometimes harmonize in our experience of a particular moment.

Advent marks the start of the Church's liturgical year, and it is my favorite new beginning because it connects me with the original beginning. The Advent readings highlight God's constant desire to bring all His people back into the intimate relationship He established with humankind when He created us in His own image. Though now distorted by sin, this intimacy has been kept alive throughout history by people with eyes to see through the distortions. In Advent we hear from or about many of them, from Israel's prophets to those who recognized who the incarnate Jesus really was. Jesus is intimacy personified; those who saw through the flesh entered into God's love and were changed. Today's reading from Zephaniah assures us, "the Lord, your God, is in your midst, a mighty savior; he will rejoice over you with gladness, and renew you in his love" (Zp 3:17). As the Risen Christ, Jesus continues to be in our midst and to call us into his love.

The seasonal changes here in the northeastern United States provide an image for this. In the weeks before Advent, the green leaves of ordinary time visibly become, as the Jesuit poet Gerald Manley Hopkins wrote, "charged with the grandeur of God." The world feels transfigured, offering a glimpse here on earth of the fully realized Kingdom that Jesus promises. And then the leaves fall away, revealing—just as we enter Advent—the underpinning of the wood that nourishes each tree's leaves.

The bare branches recall my favorite passage in the Bible, that of the vine and the branches. Jesus tells his closest companions at the Last Supper, "Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit" (Jn15:4-5a). I see



the wood and the leaves of the trees as the equivalent in our neck of the woods to Jerusalem's vine and branches. Jesus is the tree's wood; he invites us into an intimate, fruitful friendship. We are the living leaves that can offer shade and

comfort to those around us and that will be transformed in due season. The reappearance of the bare wood reminds me that my capacity to be a fruitful leaf is rooted in my relationship with Jesus and calls me to focus more intentionally on that relationship.

Without leaves on the trees, the landscape becomes starker but also less cluttered. I can see my neighbors' houses more clearly. I start to see myself more clearly as well. St. Augustine's observation that "our hearts are restless until they rest in thee" begins to stir in me as I recognize a certain restlessness that tells me that my heart has drifted and God is calling me back. And this overlaps with the focus of Advent. As the leaves are swept away, so too I feel my heart being swept out. I become aware of lazy habits that have crept in, of graces I've started to take for granted, of issues I've been neglecting. Preparing for the coming of Jesus, I consider how I can let the Christ in me come more fully into the world.

These sober considerations contain joy as well, the joy that looks ahead to the Kingdom and the joy of working hand-in-hand with Jesus to build that Kingdom here and now. Today, on Gaudete Sunday, the Church focuses on this joy. Muted

purple gives way to lively rose. The readings speak of rejoicing, of anxiety melting away, and of hearts that are full. For a moment we put aside the struggle and bask in the promised outcome. And the outcome is a glorious one, a return to the peaceful, just, and harmonious creation God intended. Sin has created divisions that lead to conflict and enmity. At the start of its year, the Church invites us to attend to these fault lines even as we deepen our confidence in God's promise of a world made whole.

Advent is not a time for reliving the events of the past year—that's a project for the calendar year. It is not a time for drawing up a balance sheet or settling accounts—that's a project for the fiscal year. It's not a time for creating agendas and planning future events—that's a project for the academic year. Instead, Advent invites us to reflect by the light of Christ on where we find ourselves in our movement toward Him. It is a time to listen in silence for God's call to us, to pray to be open to it, and to consider what might be impeding our capacity to hear and respond. It is a time to begin anew, to "wait in joyful hope for the coming of our savior Christ the Lord," in the world and within ourselves.
