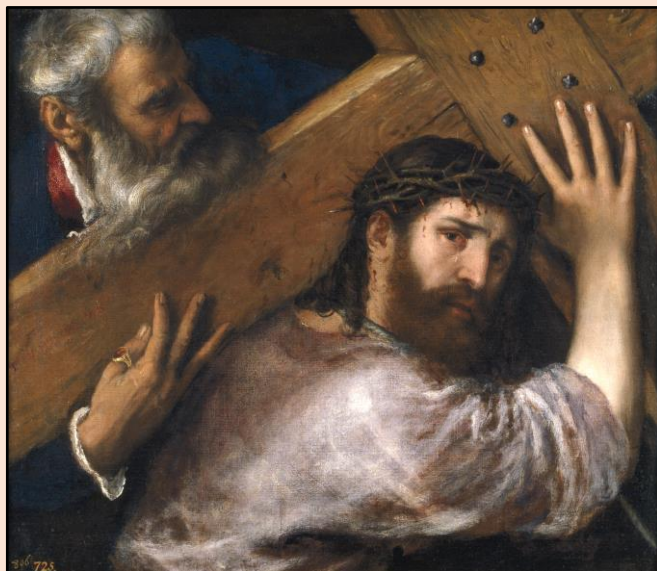
January 27, 2019 | The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

*“May your passion and death be my strength and life.”*

*The following essay is the first of an occasional series that springs from the desire to find God in all things, especially in one's work. The words of Teilhard de Chardin in The Divine Milieu are apt: God “awaits us every instant in our action, in the work of the moment. There is a sense in which he is at the tip of my pen, my spade, my brush, my needle—of my heart and of my thought. By pressing the stroke, the line, or the stitch, on which I am engaged, to its ultimate natural finish, I shall lay hold of that last end towards which my innermost will tends.”*

When someone learns that I am a nurse or I talk with someone about my work, I am often asked the question: “How did you know you wanted to be a nurse?” Truthfully, the thought of becoming a nurse never crossed my mind until I was nearing 30 years old and a Jesuit novice. Yes, I'd studied biology as an undergrad but mainly because I always had a passion for science and considered becoming a dentist. After I decided against moving on to dental school, I worked as a youth minister and then taught high school biology and chemistry for some years before entering the Jesuit novitiate.

Saint Ignatius prescribed that novices undergo a series of “experiments” or experiences, one of which is the “hospital experiment.” For the hospital experiment, I was sent to Calvary Hospital in the Bronx, NY for about three months to work as a nursing aide, or what previously might have been known as an orderly. Calvary Hospital is a special



palliative care hospital which cares for adults with incurable end-stage cancer at the end of life. It has been the site of the hospital experiment for novices of the Maryland and New York Provinces of the Society of Jesus for many years. (Father Modrys was in the first class of novices sent there.)

The work mainly consisted of cleaning, bathing and feeding patients, helping to move patients that couldn't move on their own, etc. As you might imagine, it was an eye-opening and challenging experience. Never before had I so closely witnessed anyone made so helpless and vulnerable by illness that they totally relied on the love and compassion of others. This can be quite overwhelming. And while some of my novice classmates were reluctant to return to the hospital each day, I felt increasingly

drawn to be back there each morning to be able to help care for the patients.

The patients at Calvary Hospital were dying, and the mission of the physicians and nurses there was to ensure that the patients were “physically, spiritually and emotionally comfortable as possible.” The experience of serving at Calvary enabled me to understand the person of Jesus in a new and intimate way; for the first time, I felt close to the dying Christ. In my mind, there was clearly no coincidence that this place was named Calvary. In a profound spiritual way, I was taken to the foot of the cross to serve Jesus by caring for the patients. The months spent in the hospital experiment were a special time of discernment for me. As I prayed about my nursing experiences at Calvary, I was ignited with a newfound passion and desire to care for the sick and dying and felt confirmed that God would give me the grace and gifts to be able to do so. Through my prayer I both realized and decided that if I didn’t pursue life in the Society of Jesus, I would return to school to become a nurse, and indeed, that is just what happened.

All of my professional nursing career has been spent working in critical care. In the intensive care unit we witness a vast spectrum of outcomes and emotions among those we care for: from the joys of unexpected recovery to the tragedy of sudden death, from the triumphs of cure through medical advances to the peaceful passing of a hospice patient. Increasingly beautiful to me has been the opportunity to become closer to Jesus, particularly

in his passion, death, and resurrection, whether caring for patients and families in times of pain and suffering or in joy and victory. The work of a nurse or other health care worker can be so rewarding and fruitful; it can also be challenging, tiring, and emotionally draining by its demands. In those times of adversity or struggle, my spirit is renewed by the recollection of Jesus’ words in the parable in Matthew’s Gospel, “whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” I am strengthened by the grace of knowing I am serving the suffering Jesus.

For many years, one of my favorite prayers has been David Fleming SJ’s paraphrase of the *Anima Christi* prayer found in Saint Ignatius’ *Spiritual Exercises*. When I pray with these words, I feel my vocation as a nurse is inspired and sustained particularly by these two lines: “May your passion and death be my strength and life. Jesus, with you by my side enough has been given.” Here is the prayer in its entirety:

*Jesus, may all that is in you flow into me.  
May your body and blood be my food and drink.  
May your passion and death be my strength and  
life.  
Jesus, with you by my side enough has been given.  
May the shelter I seek be the shadow of your cross.  
Let me not run from the love which you offer.  
But hold me safe from the forces of evil.  
On each of my dyings shed your light and your love.  
Keep calling to me until that day comes.  
When with your saints, I may praise you forever.  
Amen.*

*Here is a listing of parish Ordinary Income and Expenses for the first half of our fiscal year, covering July through December. As you can see, we are somewhat lagging behind last year's financial pace.*

*We are still showing an operating surplus, but much reduced from last year. This year, Income is down \$26,000 and Expenses are up \$26,000. That's a pretty quick explanation for the difference of \$52,000 in the bottom line.*

*Probing a little deeper, why did Income decline from \$447,000 last year to \$422,000 this year? Sunday Contributions are down by \$12,000; the Christmas Collection was \$4,000 less than last year, and Wedding Income was down by \$5,000.*

*On the Expense side, our maintenance costs rose by \$16,000 (mostly due to boiler repairs) and Jesuit Community expenses were up by \$9,000, though much of that was due to an accounting change from last year.*

*A generous response in the coming months would put us back in a more favorable position.*

*What is more disconcerting is what does not appear in the Flash Report. Last fiscal year our reserve funds, invested in the stock market, were all gaining value in line with the rising market. But this year the market is not performing as well and so we are giving back some of those previous gains. Taking all this into consideration, we are still showing a surplus for the first half of the year. But last year at this point our overall surplus was \$133,000 and this year it is only \$9,000.*

*A sincere thank you to all our benefactors who make it possible for our parish to function and serve as a spiritual home for so many.*
