Open Wide Our Hearts

At their November 2018 General Meeting, the US Catholic bishops approved as a formal statement *Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love—A Pastoral Statement Against Racism*. As the words 'enduring call' suggest, this is not the first time the US Bishops have made a formal statement against racism. In 1958, a predecessor body called the National Catholic Welfare Conference spoke out about *Discrimination and Christian Conscience*. In 1968, the US bishops made a formal statement called *On the Race Crisis*, and in 1979 adopted an earlier pastoral letter, *Brothers and Sisters to Us*.

After reading and re-reading *Open Wide Our Hearts*, I made a list of pluses and minuses about this pastoral letter. Let's start with the positives:

First, the US bishops recognize that racism remains a "particularly destructive and persistent form of evil" and that the current state of race relations in the United States does not meet the standard of justice.

Second, *Open Wide Our Hearts* makes clear that "there is no place for racism in the hearts of any person; it is a perversion of the Lord's will for men and women, all of whom were made in God's image and likeness." The document counts racism among high priority 'life issues' that threaten human dignity.



Third, to the Bishops' credit, they try to wrestle with the complexity of the evil of racism. They resist simple definitions, and link conscious and unconscious attitudes with hateful speech and symbols, deliberate acts, unthinking complicity, and unjust social institutions.

But my briefer list of negatives weighs heavily in my final evaluation of *Open Wide Our Hearts*. To explain why, I must first be clear about the perspective I bring to the pastoral letter: I am white. I have enjoyed the advantages of well-funded public and higher education. My family has had access to economic mobility through the wealth that home ownership creates, and we've also enjoyed the safety and security that our homes and neighborhoods have afforded us. I have benefited

from all the privileges of white, middle class America.

As I read this pastoral letter, it seems addressed to me; it speaks my language and I—and people like me—am its intended audience, the chosen conversation partner of the US bishops. And that is my first disappointment with *Open Wide Our Hearts*. This reads like a white document for white people, and as such, it is unlikely to ever advance the “right relationship with God, with one another, and with the rest of God’s creation” that it calls the original meaning of justice.

The committee of bishops who shepherded this letter to publication is a diverse one, but curiously muted in *Open Wide Our Hearts* are the voices of people who are not like me. There are no firsthand accounts or historical and statistical descriptions of the experiences of growing up and living and worshipping as African American, Asian American, Hispanic or Native American Catholics. Without the voices of the people who experience racism participating in—and directing—the conversation about it, privileged readers like me miss real opportunities for understanding, for empathy and for solidarity.

But there’s a more worrisome problem in the final ‘call to action’ section of *Open Wide Our Hearts*. This part of the pastoral letter begins well, with a straightforward acknowledgement of the US Catholic Church’s sins of racism, both in what it has done and what it has failed to do.

But after that, *Open Wide Our Hearts* falls short of the standard that the US Bishops held

themselves and the US Catholic community to in their previous pastoral letters *To Teach as Jesus Did* (1972) and *Economic Justice for All* (1988): “Since the Christian vocation is a call to transform oneself and society with God’s help, the educational efforts of the Church must encompass the twin purpose of personal sanctification and social reform in the light of Christian values.” Interior conversion and external action are both required, but in *Open Wide our Hearts*, only the former commands the bishops’ attention.

To ask, as does this pastoral letter, for education, openness to encounter, prayer and imitation of holy example is to stop short at interior conversion. None of these demand any real, substantive external action. I can pray, encounter, and imitate without my conversion of heart yielding any fruit of social change. Moreover, to focus on the conversion of the privileged is to once again ignore what’s been missing all along: the agency of *all* people created in the image of and destined for communion with God. Would that the call not be to ‘open wide my heart’ but to open wide my eyes and stop acting like the world revolved around me! Would that the call were to open wide the doors and let everyone in, to open wide the checkbook and fully fund schools and social services, and to open wide the circle, so that the people whose lives are at stake are the ones making the decisions that affect them. Then, perhaps, there will be justice—not we the privileged acting on behalf of you the other, but just us, together creating a beloved community.
