## The Trinity in Action

I once began a talk by asking “What’s your favorite line in the Eucharistic Prayer?” but people looked back at me with blank faces. So I tried again, and asked “Recite a line—any line—from the Eucharistic Prayer.” Again, nothing but blank stares. I was talking to people who had probably attended a thousand Masses in their lifetimes, but nobody could remember a single line from the principal prayer of the Mass. That’s when I realized that we often just let the Eucharistic Prayer wash over us, leaving hardly any impression.

Fittingly for something so profound and dynamic, we prepare for the Eucharistic Prayer with dialogue:

*The Lord be with you/And with your spirit.*

*Lift up your hearts/We lift them up to the Lord.*

*Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. . .*

Next comes the Preface Prayer, which varies with the seasons and is followed by our acclamation *Holy, Holy, Holy. . .* What follows is the Eucharistic Prayer itself, which ends with the final doxology: *Through him, and with him, and in him. . .* and the great *Amen!*

Between that opening dialogue and the final Amen, the Eucharistic Prayer is filled with the action of addressing the Father directly. We **praise** the Father for his goodness towards us. Then we **ask** him to **send** his Holy Spirit to **transform** our completely ordinary gifts of bread and wine into the body and blood of his Son. The prayer, therefore, is thoroughly Trinitarian: we address the Father, joining ourselves to the Son through the power of



the Spirit. This Trinitarian character is of prime importance in order to understand the dynamic of the Eucharistic prayer.

There are now a number of different versions of the Eucharistic Prayer. Before the reforms of Vatican II, there was, except in churches of the Eastern Rite, just one, called the Roman Canon. (Canon is another name for the Eucharistic Prayer.) But Vatican II recovered other Eucharistic Prayers from ancient traditions and returned them to general use. Every version of the Eucharistic Prayer contains the same essential elements:

Praise to the Father:

*Father, you are holy indeed, and all creation rightly gives you praise. . .*

Invocation of the Spirit over the gifts, or the  
Epiclesis:

*by the power of your Spirit, sanctify these gifts . . .  
that they may become the body and blood of your  
Son. . .*

Words of Institution or the Consecration:

*he took bread and gave you thanks and praise. . .  
when supper was ended, . . .*

Remembrance or Anamnesis:

*Calling to mind, Lord God, the death your son  
endured for our salvation, his glorious resurrection  
and ascension . . .*

Offering of Christ to the Father:

*We offer you . . . this holy and living sacrifice.*

Another Invocation (Epiclesis) of the Spirit, this  
time on the people gathered:

*Grant that we . . . may be filled with his Holy Spirit*

Petitions:

*For the peace and salvation of the whole world  
. . .for our pilgrim Church. . .that we may share in  
the inheritance of the saints. . .for our departed  
brothers and sisters. . .*

Praise or Doxology:

*Through him, and with him, and in him, O God,  
almighty Father, In the unity of the Holy Spirit. . .*

There are a number of technical terms that  
traditionally refer to the important parts of the  
prayer. *Epiclesis* is a Greek word that means calling  
down. We ask the Father to call down the Spirit.  
*Anamnesis* is the Greek word for remembrance. We  
remember Christ's death and resurrection.  
*Doxology* is a Greek word meaning to give glory or  
praise. We glorify the Father with Christ in union  
with the Spirit.

Focusing too narrowly on only one part of the  
Eucharistic Prayer diminishes our understanding.

This happened, for example, in the church's  
reaction to Protestant rejection of the Catholic  
Mass. Catholic teaching began to emphasize the  
doctrine of transubstantiation. Using the categories  
of Aristotelian philosophy, transubstantiation  
affirms that the substance of the bread and wine is  
changed, but the accidents (the 'externals') remain  
the same. Unfortunately, in popular consciousness  
such philosophical defenses of the real presence of  
Christ in the Eucharist obscured the words and  
action of the Eucharistic Prayer itself. People lost  
sight of the work of the Trinity, forgetting that the  
miracle of Christ's presence is the work of the Spirit  
who is sent by the Father.

The words of consecration became an exact  
formula to be precisely recited, over-emphasized  
with bells ringing and the host held high for  
adoration. But heard within the context of the  
whole Eucharistic Prayer, the words of consecration  
are actually a **story** told to the Father about what  
Jesus did for us. (Isn't that a beautiful way to enter  
into the mystery of the Eucharist?) This story  
makes the presence of Jesus real for us because the  
Father has sent the Holy Spirit upon the objects of  
bread and wine, which now carry the meaning of  
the story spoken over them as the body and blood  
of Christ.

So the Eucharist is not some sacred object to be  
carefully stored in a tabernacle for future  
communions. It is the way we remember Jesus, not  
just as an historical figure who lived a long time  
ago, but the Jesus who suffered and died for us and  
now is with us as the risen Lord. This is the  
*anamnesis* of the Mass—the remembering—that  
inspires us to join the glorified Jesus in offering  
ourselves to the Father. This is the second *epiclesis*,  
the Spirit coming upon us to transform us, the way

the Spirit has transformed the elements of bread and wine. We become *one body, one spirit, in Christ*.

At this point in the action of the Eucharistic Prayer, it is time to ask for what we need, just as Jesus taught us—in the Lord’s Prayer, for example—to pray by bringing our deepest desires to his Father. These petitions are truly universal, modeling how to transcend our small-mindedness and narrow self-interest with prayers for ourselves, for all of God’s people, all our brothers and sisters, and for all the dead.

Finally, the Eucharistic Prayer ends where it began: with praise of the Father. Now we are transformed, intimately joined to the action of Jesus himself. And so with the body and blood of Christ raised above us, and in union with the Holy Spirit, we solemnly proclaim to the Father that *all glory and honor is yours, forever and ever. . . AMEN!*
