Augustine and the Art of Worship

The following essay is part of an occasional series that springs from the desire to find God in all things. Once again, the words of Teilhard de Chardin in The Divine Milieu are apt: "God truly waits for us in things, unless indeed he advances to meet us." Enjoy this week's essay:

I first came to Old St. Joseph Church in the summer of 2017 accompanying my then girlfriend, Maxine. A year and a half later, I have converted to Catholicism as a member of the 2018 Old St. Joseph's RCIA cohort and was married to Maxine in this community on a perfect fall day in October. Why did this special church come to feel so right, so like home, and so quickly when I had visited and attended services at many other churches over the years? The answer lies in the baptismal name I chose, for which Father Modrys teased me a little because of the presumption of associating oneself with so lofty a figure: Augustine.


Chances are you've dipped into *The City of God* or the *Confessions* at some point in your own faith journey. My first encounter with the writings of St. Augustine of Hippo came not in church but rather in a musicology class. For students of the history of art and music, Augustine is assigned early and often, specifically the sections of the *Confessions* (Book X, Ch. 33-4) in which he discusses what he calls "pleasures of the ear" and "pleasures of the eye." There has never been so succinct and moving a statement of the challenges and possibilities of artistic beauty in the service of



worship, and of the very factors that make Old St. Joseph's so dear to me. By his own account, Augustine had an eager ear for music and struggled mightily with the question of whether that sensual pleasure he found in himself was excessive and sinful affection for earthly things or a way to spiritual insight. Music had played a crucial role in his own path to Christianity and Augustine speaks forcefully in defense of the medium: "I feel that when the sacred words are chanted well, our souls are moved and are more religiously and with a warmer devotion kindled to piety than if they are not so sung." However, he wrestled with the selfknowledge that he was not immune to the attractions of a catchy tune that could overwhelm the reason: "when it happens to me that the music moves me more than the subject of the song, I confess myself to commit a sin deserving punishment."

Augustine also offers insight into the uses of

painting and sculpture as aids to worship. He found himself similarly susceptible to the pleasures of "beautiful and varied forms, glowing and pleasant colors" and worried whether this might be another route to vanity and sin. While he acknowledges the risk of earthly luxuries that "entrap the eyes of men," here, too, Augustine offers one of the earliest defenses of liturgical art: "the beautiful objects designed by artists' souls and realized by skilled hands come from that beauty which is higher than souls."

How does all this relate to Old St. Joseph's and to my own faith journey? I have seen firsthand the pitfalls of an extreme option Augustine briefly contemplates in the *Confessions* in response to the dangers of excessive love of the arts: "taking excessive safeguards against being led astray," that is, seeking to eradicate beauty altogether from the worship service. The Quaker tradition in which I was raised will always be dear to me for its communal spirit and fierce commitment to social justice, grounded in the belief that there is "that of God" in everyone. Nevertheless, its zealous early proponents were dead wrong in their approach to the arts as objects of moral suspicion to be

banished from the meetinghouse and, as much as possible, from life. While things are different today and most Quakers do embrace the arts as a way to serve God and society, that former narrowness of mind is a legacy which still influences the Religious Society of Friends. What Maxine and I found at Old St. Joseph's was a community of faith that uses the arts to their best and most transporting effect, just as Augustine hoped, carrying on the legacy of the tradition that has been the greatest of all patrons of Western art. In this beautifully simple space, where truth is spoken to power in harmony with the sensitive musical leadership, we found all that I loved from the Friends of my youth and the glory of God evoked on Earth in terms we could understand and engage with intellectually and spiritually as well as sensually. We parishioners are very lucky indeed to find inspiration in such a place.
