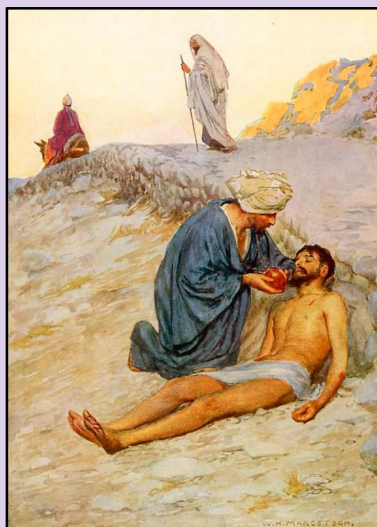
A Sneak Preview

In this essay, Fr. Dan Ruff SJ previews the March 23 retreat "Doing God's Work Through Serving Our Neighbor." Details about joining us are inside!

The first thing most people learn about Ignatian spirituality is the tagline "finding God in all things." There have been countless words written on Ignatian spirituality and the *Spiritual Exercises* they are rooted in. My elevator speech version is this: Everything in the natural universe, and especially on our beautiful blue marble Earth, was created by a loving God. Just as a painting reflects the unique touch of its artist, everything in creation—from the oceans, sun and stars to caterpillars, ants and amoebas—tells us something about the loving God who created it, if we really look, really pay attention.

Nothing in creation can tell us more about God than the last thing God created, human beings. As the Genesis stories tell us "God created humankind in God's image; in the image of God, God created them; male and female God created them" (Gn 1:27). And again, God blew God's own breath of life into the 'man of dust' (Gn 2:7).

The Genesis stories assure us that God's original intent was for human beings to till and keep the world that God created. Unfortunately, we know that God's Plan A didn't quite work out. We live with the effects of evil, so much so that it is hard to see the godliness in ourselves, or in one another. That is why Ignatius invites the retreatant to ponder the



mystery of sin—and it *is* a mystery!—at the very outset of his *Spiritual Exercises*.

Yet Ignatius, his Jesuits and all practitioners of Ignatian spirituality remain optimists in the face of the reality of sin. Why? Because God has another plan to offer us. God

offers us an exemplar of human nature at its best, its most perfect and God-like, in Jesus. God's own divine Son became incarnate for us, to lead us out of bondage to sin.

By the end of the first week of the *Spiritual Exercises*, one comes to know oneself as a loved and redeemed sinner, filled with loving gratitude and with a zealous desire to serve God. In the next step of his *Exercises*, Ignatius points all of that overflowing love and restless energy toward following Jesus.

Which finally gets us to *doing God's work through serving our neighbor*. In the "Call of the King" meditation (*Sp Ex* #91-98), Ignatius invites us to imagine that Jesus, who is more attractive and perfect than any mere earthly leader, calls us into

We are invited to follow his lead, to overcome disease, poverty, ignorance, oppression, slavery, and all the other evils which beset humankind. Honest king that he is, Jesus promises hardship along the way. He also promises that if we stay faithful to him and his project, we will share in his glory as well. So as Christians, it is God's work that we do when we serve our neighbor. We learn to see through Jesus' eyes, to see every person as a child of God. We want to emulate Jesus and work alongside him in his ongoing project of redeeming our fallen world.

There is a lot more to be said; more than this bulletin meditation can hold. If you are intrigued and want to learn more, I encourage you to be part of the March 23 retreat organized by OSJ's Ignatian Spirituality Committee (details below). If you haven't ever been on a retreat—or at least, not lately—let me say a word about why you might want to go.

One of our marketing professors at St. Joseph's University, Dr. Smith, likes to remind his students

that we live in an "attention economy." All kinds of people and entities spend a great deal of money and creative effort trying to capture our attention. On our end, Dr. Smith points out, we spend our attention on things and people that we care about.

During Lent, it is particularly appropriate to really look, to really pay attention to people and things we care deeply about—God, Jesus and our own journey of discipleship. If we can, we go to a beautiful and quiet place (like the St. Raphaela Center in Haverford) where we can slow down, take a deep breath, and ask ourselves: Where am I in following Jesus? In serving my neighbor? Who is my neighbor?

Give yourself a gift this Lent. Take a few hours on March 23 to renew your sense of purpose and meaning in doing God's work by serving your neighbor. Come, find God in all things!

Sacrament of Baptism

Persons wanting to arrange a baptism should call Fr. Dougherty at the parish office at least two months before the desired date to arrange catechesis and the baptism celebration.

The Sacrament of Anointing

The Sacrament of Anointing (the sacrament of the sick) is administered during the 12:05 PM Mass on the first Saturday of each month. Homebound or hospitalized persons wanting to receive the Sacrament of Anointing should call the parish office.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Persons wanting to be married in the parish should call Fr. O'Donnell at the parish office at least nine months before the desired date.

Rite of Christian Initiation

Unbaptized adults who are considering baptism into the Catholic Church, baptized Catholics who have received no other sacraments and who want to be confirmed and to receive First Eucharist, and baptized non-Catholics who are considering full communion in the Catholic Church should call Fr. O'Donnell at the parish office.
