Today's Gospel: John 1:29-34

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said,

"Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.

He is the one of whom I said,

'A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.'

I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was that he might be made known to Israel." John testified further, saying,

I joined the Reading Group at OSJ when I first moved into the parish and have found it to be a wonderful connection to the parish community and to my faith. At first, I was a bit hesitant to sign up: the announcement came from the moderator, Dr Carol Schloss, a professor at University of Pennsylvania. Would the writing be too challenging, or only religious texts? Turns out, we read everything from short stories to novels, contemporary and classic, as chosen by the group.

THIS WEEK IN JESUIT HISTORY: January 16 -23


History: January 15, 1544. Francis Xavier writes a famous letter on his apostolic labors in the Indies, saying he wished to visit all the Universities of Europe to search for laborers for the Lord's vineyards. The letter rapidly circulates and inspired hundreds of young men to join the novitiate.

Part of Xavier's letter reads: "The native Christians have no priests. They know only that they are Christians. There is nobody to say Mass for them; nobody to teach them the Creed, the Our Father, the Hail Mary and the Commandments of God's Law. I have not stopped since the day I arrived. I bathed in the sacred waters all the children who had not yet been baptized. The older children would not let me say my Office or eat or sleep until I taught them one prayer or another. Then I began to understand: "The kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." I noticed among them persons of great intelligence. If only someone could educate them in the Christian way of life, I have no doubt that they would make excellent Christians. Many, many people hereabouts are not becoming Christians for one reason only: there is nobody to make them Christians. Again and again, I have thought of going round the universities of Europe, especially Paris, and everywhere crying out like a madman, riveting the attention of those with more learning than charity. I wish they would work as hard at this as they do at their books, and so settle their account with God for their learning and the talents entrusted to them."

Saint: January 19 Blessed James Sales SJ and Blessed William Saultemouche, SJ martyrs. In 1593 French Huguenots tortured and killed them because they would not renounce their belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

Do you speak Ignatian? The stances presumed for a communal discernment process. Element 1: personal prayer The late Fr. Bill Barry SJ. points out that communal discernment presupposes that those who will engage in it have experienced the discernment of spirits in themselves, that is, they engage in a process of contemplative prayer as proposed in the Spiritual Exercises, and have experienced the movement of the different spirits, discerning which are from God, and which not. They have come to experience God's speaking to them and can then communicate to others their experience in prayer and prayerful reflection. Such religious experience and the willingness to communicate it are central to communal discernment.

Please join Fr. Frank Hannafey SJ, Fr. Paul Holland SJ and your Parish Pastoral Council on Sunday January 22 after the joint 10:30 AM Mass for a parish-wide prayer for discernment. The primary question for which we will seek guidance is: "How do we as a parish live the call to social justice?"

Immediately after Mass, we will gather in Barbelin Hall for refreshments, and then convene to pray together about the way forward in our social justice ministry. We expect to convene for about one hour.

The Society of Jesus has opted for a "universal apostolic preference" calling all Jesuits and all of their ministries to "walk with the poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice". As a Jesuit parish, how are we called to respond to this invitation? Council now invites everyone in our community to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit in finding our calling in this way of Christian discipleship.

Based upon the spirituality of St. Ignatius, the Jesuits utilize a process of "group discernment" that differs fundamentally from the usual business meeting. It is a form of group prayer, and it emphasizes careful listening to every participant. We pray that you will join us in deliberating together in this way, in the presence of the Holy Spirit!

The OSJ Reading Group will meet on Tuesday 7 February 2023 at 7.30 p.m. via Zoom. Our book for the month is Annie Ernaux: A Girl's Story. If you would like to join, please contact Carol Shloss: shlosscarol@gmail.com.
