THIS WEEK IN JESUIT HISTORY: February 12 - 18

February 17, 1978: Georgetown University conferred an honorary doctorate on Archbishop Oscar Romero in the Cathedral of San Salvador, for his leadership for justice and human rights. He was assassinated while saying mass on March 24, 1980. A United Nations Truth Commission for El Salvador concluded that Roberto D'Aubuisson, a death squad leader had ordered the killing.

Saints February 15: Claude La Columbiere priest (1641-1682) He was the Spiritual director to St. Margaret Mary, ADD ABOUT SACRED HEART DEVOTION and for two years chaplain in England to the Duchess of York. He was then arrested, committed to prison in connection with the Oates' Plot and banished from the country.

Do you speak Ignatian? Communal discernment element 4: Attentive listening.

The goal of active listening is to seek to understand others as they are in the parish discerning conversation on January 22, participants were invited, in the first round of sharing, to engage in attentive listening and intentional speaking. Such listening is called "active" because it means paying attention to more than one level of expression of the other Those attending were asked to listen to what each other participant said, what that person meant to say, and what it could mean for that person to say it. Active listening means welcoming non-judgmentally whatever the person says, Attentive listening gives rise to the question, "What might the Spirit be saying to us through that person?" Non-judgmental welcome means no criticizing or disagreeing, at least not at first, and not until the other person trusts you, and not until you think you have understood what the person means. This is a profound welcome of the other person in his or her radical uniqueness. During the first round of discerning listening, participants don't respond to what another has said. There is no attempt to debate, argue or even persuade. Instead, each voice is heard and valued.

Lent: It's all about Baptism!

Ash Wednesday: February 22: Mass and ashes at 12:05 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Lent the Church's *annual retreat*: We look more closely at how God is active in our lives, examine our response or lack of it to that grace, and discern how God is calling us forward.



Ashes to Easter: Easter is the high-point of our liturgical year, as we plunge more intensely into the paschal mystery of Christ's dying-and-rising, when we are made a "new creation in Christ." The Church initiated us into that mystery at our Baptism, and that journey will culminate when Christ raises us to eternal life.

Catechumens and Candidates: Easter is the privileged time for Catechumens and Candidates to enter the Church, through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. We have walked with them as they have responded to Christ's call to continual conversion of life and an ever more generous response to God's grace. Our solidarity with them leads us into our own renewed commitment to our Baptismal promises and ongoing conversion, expressed through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. This solidarity is the origin of Lent, modeled on Christ's own 40 days of prayer and fasting in the desert after his Baptism.

Baptism: At the Easter Vigil, we will renew our baptismal vows, by which we renew our covenant, made in the Blood of Christ, the Sacrificed Lamb of God. We re-commit ourselves as disciples of Jesus, commissioned to collaborate in his work of building the Kingdom of God. And we receive into that covenant those to be baptized.

Prayer, Fasting, Almsgiving: These traditional Lenten practices invite us to unite ourselves more closely to the Lord, to "fast" in ways that deepen our hunger for God, and to extend practical concern for those in need


We will distribute a booklet of **Daily Reflections for Lent** on Ash Wednesday and will also make it available in the back of church. There will be also a Communal Penance as well as Stations of the Cross during Lent.

Our Lenten liturgies will invite a **"fast of the senses,**" through more somber music and more silence. We will begin each Sunday Mass kneeling to recite the Confiteor. We will not have flowers or incense at Mass during Lent. The Alleluia is "buried" until Easter and the Gloria is not sung or said. These will be restored in abundance on Easter!

We will once again participate in **Operation Rice Bowl** and we will take up that collection at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday

Holy Week: Palm Sunday. Tenebrae. Chrism Mass. Holy Thursday. Good Friday. Easter Vigil. More news about each of these grace-filled liturgies in upcoming bulletins.

Easter: Through our RCIA program, we will baptize Andrew Huff during the Easter Vigil. Rick Carlson, already baptized in another denomination, will be received into the Church and confirmed. Joria Le and Tressi Magliano, already baptized in the Catholic Church, will also be confirmed. As they continue their formation in the faith, we join our prayers with theirs as we prepare to welcome them as our new sisters and brothers.


