OUR JESUIT APOSTOLIC MISSION

In our church, at the sacristy entrance, stands a statue of Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus. His Jesuit followers support and minister to us at Old Saint Joseph's parish. They count on us to be a vital part of their apostolic mission.

The Jesuits have prayerfully sought to discern God's will for their worldwide apostolic ministries, including their parish ministries. In 2019, this discernment resulted in the publication of their "Universal Apostolic Preferences", https://www.jesuits.global/uap/. These "UAPs" help them to be "guided by the Spirit" as they seek to "deepen personal, communal, and institutional conversion" and create "a process of apostolic revitalization and creativity that makes [them] better servants of reconciliation and justice."

Ideally, all that we do at OSJ is part of the "apostolic revitalization and creativity" expressed in the UAPs. As baptized Catholic apostles of Jesus, and as a parish gratefully served by Jesuits, we are invited to collaborate in the Jesuits' apostolic work. Centered in our communal celebration of the Eucharist each week, our worship, ministries and governance are all grounded in the ethos of Saint Ignatius' Spiritual Exercises. Our life as a parish reflects the Jesuit approach to living the Gospel and co-laboring with the Jesuits in ministry.

Let us consider the four UAPs in condensed form, as a lens through which we view our parish mission, and how we respond to their guidance as a parish, both now and in the future:

A.) To show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment:

We ground all that we do upon prayerful discernment of God's will, by sharing our Eucharistic prayer as a community, and by providing varied opportunities to grow in the regular habit of prayer and discernment. We seek to deepen our individual and communal conversion through various opportunities throughout the year, including inspirational readings, spiritual conversation and retreats. We facilitate making the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises available for all who desire to participate in spiritual direction. Through our Pastoral Council and Spirituality Committee, we will continue to develop spirituality programs to help people live out their faith in community, family and society.

B.) To walk with the poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice:

We seek out opportunities to "walk with "the poor and outcast. We offer communal meals, social services, spiritual healing and comfort to impoverished and unhoused people through our thrice weekly Faith, Food and Friends program. We visit the hospitalized and homebound, bringing them Eucharist and companionship. We are planning new community engagement and catechesis to discern our communal and individual calling to establish a broader social justice ministry.

C.) To accompany young people in the creation of a hope-filled future:

Currently, our PREP program of religious education and the Children's Liturgy of the Word serve the youngest members of our community, helping them come to Christian maturity. In pastoral planning, we are discerning ways to support the Young Adult Community as they seek to live the Gospel in their careers and relationships.

D.) To collaborate in the care of our Common Home:

After studying Pope Francis' encyclical exhorting us to care for the created world, we formed a new Care for Creation Committee, to create informational and direct-action programs to increase care for the earth, and to enhance our collaboration with EcoPhilly and other parishes in the Archdiocese.

All are invited to share in the work of living out the Gospel as a parish community. Collaborating as parishioners and friends, all of us aim to grow in a deeper understanding of God's will. Participating together, let us be guided by the UAPs. What we are currently doing as a parish, what we propose to do, and what we discern to be a specific need should all flow from the spirit of the UAPs.

In that way, our parish will seek to move forward as a community, ensure that we keep our priorities focused on the same priorities as the broader Jesuit Provincial community and embrace opportunities to work collaboratively with the Jesuit apostolate of Philadelphia, as well as the Archdiocese, all for the greater glory of God.

THIS WEEK IN JESUIT HISTORY: February 19 - 25

History: February 20, 1515. During the night of Mardi Gras, Inigo (later Ignatius) Loyola engaged in "premeditated and enormous crimes" during which "ambush and treachery were prearranged." Under threat of arrest, Inigo fled to Pamplona, but authorities there put him in prison. The court record indicated that Inigo had a reputation for engaging in dueling and immoral affairs. He was acquitted and fled back to the royal court. An elderly aunt who was a nun declared, "Inigo, you will not learn nor become wise until someone breaks your leg." His "cannonball moment" would come in Pamplona in 1521.

Saints: February 21 Robert Southwell martyred in 1595, after he had endured brutal tortures at the house of Richard Topcliffe, a professional priest-hunter, and then in prison. He embraced the jailer who brought him word that he had been sentenced to death. As he breathed his last, Lord Mountjoy, who presided over the execution, exclaimed, "May my soul be one day with that of this man."

Do you speak Ignatian? Communal discernment element 5: Intentional speaking and transparency

Linked to attentive listening (last week's element) is intentional speaking. In our parish discerning conversation of January 22, participants were asked to try to speak from their own experience and prayer, using "I' statements." The question behind this is, "What might the Spirit be saying to me, through me?" The main purpose of spiritual conversation, in attentive listening and intentional speaking, is to create an atmosphere of trust and welcome so that people may more readily express themselves frankly. It allows them to take seriously whatever is going on within them. This transparency makes the perception of spiritual movements easier and, eventually, the Spirit's involvement.

Lent: It's all about Baptism!

Ash Wednesday: February 22: Mass and ashes at 12:05 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Lent the Church's *annual retreat***:** We look more closely at how God is active in our lives, examine our response or lack of it to that grace, and discern how God is calling us forward.

Ashes to Easter: Easter is the high-point of our liturgical year, as we plunge more intensely into the paschal mystery of Christ's dying-and-rising, when we are made a "new creation in Christ." The Church initiated us into that mystery at our Baptism, and that journey will culminate when Christ raises us to eternal life.

Catechumens and Candidates: Easter is the privileged time for Catechumens and Candidates to enter the Church, through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. We have walked with them as they have responded to Christ's call to continual conversion of life and an ever more generous response to God's grace. Our solidarity with them leads us into our own renewed commitment to our Baptismal promises and ongoing conversion, expressed through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. This solidarity is the origin of Lent, modeled on Christ's own 40 days of prayer and fasting in the desert after his Baptism.

Baptism: At the Easter Vigil, we will renew our baptismal vows, by which we renew our covenant, made in the Blood of Christ, the Sacrificed Lamb of God. We re-commit ourselves as disciples of Jesus, commissioned to collaborate in his work of building the Kingdom of God. And we receive into that covenant those to be baptized.

Prayer, Fasting, Almsgiving: These traditional Lenten practices invite us to unite ourselves more closely to the Lord, to "fast" in ways that deepen our hunger for God, and to extend practical concern for those in need


We will distribute a booklet of **Daily Reflections for Lent** on Ash Wednesday and will also make it available in the back of church. There will be also a Communal Penance as well as Stations of the Cross during Lent.

Our Lenten liturgies will invite a "fast of the senses," through more somber music and more silence. We will begin each Sunday Mass kneeling to recite the Confiteor. We will not have flowers or incense at Mass during Lent. The Alleluia is "buried" until Easter and the Gloria is not sung or said. These will be restored in abundance on Easter!

We will once again participate in **Operation Rice Bowl** and we will take up that collection at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday

Holy Week: Palm Sunday. Tenebrae. Chrism Mass. Holy Thursday. Good Friday. Easter Vigil. More news about each of these grace-filled liturgies in upcoming bulletins.


