

Today's Gospel:

John 11: 3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45

The sisters of Lazarus sent word to Jesus, saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." When Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever

believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

He became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?"

So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go."

Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.

THIS WEEK IN JESUIT HISTORY: March 26 - April 1

History March 29, 1523: Ignatius arrives in Rome for the first time, on Palm Sunday. Four months later he leaves for Jerusalem. His pilgrimage to the Holy Land had been delayed for about a year because the port of Barcelona was closed due to plague. Inigo had tarried in near-by Manresa, undergoing the religious experiences and practices which form the Spiritual Exercises.

Saint March 31, 1601 Blessed Robert Middleton: He may have returned to the Catholic Church after Margaret Clitherow was martyred in March 1586 for harboring priests. Middleton went to the Continent in 1594, and eventually was ordained four years later. He returned to England and spent two years in Lancaster before being arrested, along with Fr. Thurstan Hunt S.J. Under torture, they admitted they were priests, acknowledged Queen Elizabeth's authority in temporal matters, and prayed for God to bring her back to the Catholic Church. Sometime in 1599 Fr. Middleton had requested to be admitted to the Jesuits, but by the time the General approved the request, Middleton was already in prison so it is not certain that he knew he had been admitted. Both priests were hanged, but Middleton was cut down before he was fully dead, so he was also beheaded. He was beatified in 1987 and is accounted among the Jesuit Martyrs of England and Wales.

Ignatian Spirituality Thinking with the Church: Although his spirituality emphasizes an intense personal relationship between an individual and God (a distinctly modern facet), Ignatius was convinced that this relationship has to be firmly embedded in the Church, so he stresses the virtue of "thinking with the Church." He cautions that individual judgement is not trustworthy. Instead, Ignatius is convinced that "in Christ our Lord, the bridegroom, and in His Spouse the Church, only one Spirit holds sway, which governs and rules for the salvation of souls. It is by the same Spirit and Lord who gave the Ten Commandments that our holy Mother Church is ruled and governed." The Church is trustworthy, says Ignatius, because it is ultimately governed and guided by God. This from a man who knew the institution's corruption, who saw up close the divisions of the Reformation, and who himself was imprisoned and interrogated by the Inquisition three times! Yet Ignatius remained confident that the Church is not a merely human institution. Just as Jesus lived among sinners yet accomplished his mission of salvation, so today God works through his Spouse the Church accomplishing salvation in and through her despite all the imperfections of her members.

PARISH COUNCIL ELECTION THIS SPRING

The first terms of elected Parish Pastoral Council members were staggered to encourage continuity in membership over time. This year, two Council members will complete their one-year terms. Beginning with this year's election, all terms will be for three years.

This Spring, we will elect two candidates for threeyear terms that will start on June 1. A full description of the election process is on the Parish web site, oldstjoseph.org.

Stephen Paesani and John Bitterman, who are completing their one-year terms, will stand for election for three-year terms. All parish members may stand for election if they meet the minimum qualifications listed below.

Nominations will open on April 1 (Palm Sunday Vigil) and will end on April 16 (the Sunday after Easter). Nominations may be emailed to the Parish Pastoral Council at osjpc@oldstjoseph.org. Also, paper nomination forms will be available in the back of the church. Include the nominee's name, contact information and a brief reason for the nomination. Nominees will be reviewed for minimum qualifications and asked to submit a photo and a brief election statement for the Bulletin and website.

Voting will take place from May 6 to May 21 on the Parish website; paper ballots will also be available.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS FOR ELECTED COUNCIL MEMBER:

- Two years registered as a parish member
- Regular Mass attendance
- Active participation in a parish ministry, committee, and/or community. Due to previous pandemic restrictions, past or present activity will be accepted. The parish Bulletin lists most parish ministries, communities, and committees that can serve as a reference.
- Referral comes from a fellow parishioner. Selfnominations are not permitted.




Visitors are kindly invited to celebrate these special events with the parish.

chapter 5 ("Nine Key Themes of Catholic Social Teaching"),

and the last two sections of chapter 6 (pp. 147–155).

As you read, please note the questions at the end of each chapter. These will help you to reflect on your own response to our rich Catholic teaching on social justice and the questions will form the basis for the parish discussion.
