Who is the Patient?

You walk into the hospital room of a stranger. The individual could be young or elderly. They could be alone and recovering from a routine procedure or surrounded by family and nearing the final minutes of their earthly life. Regardless of the different paths your life and the patient's life have taken to this point, you both have come together in this moment to break bread – the Eucharistic meal.

I would argue there are two patients in this scene. The patient lying in the hospital bed being treated by medical professionals for external ailments and myself (the volunteer) who is a patient of the Church – not a hotel for saints but a "hospital" for sinners – being treated by spiritual professionals for interior ailments.

It is a mutually healing encounter for all present in the room. All are members of the body of Christ (the Church) and receiving the body of Christ (the Eucharist). As a member of Old Saint Joseph's hospital ministry program, I have had the privilege of participating in and witnessing these encounters on numerous occasions.

Lector Ministry, Lou Anne Bulik, Coordinator

I have served as a lector at Old St. Joseph's for about 15 years, and before that as a lector at St. Joseph's in Greenwich Village, NY, for about 15 more.

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The lector does not read a passage from scripture; the lector proclaims the Word of God, and it's essential for anyone who wants to serve as a lector to understand this difference. The message, this Word of God, is very important, and the lector needs to treat it as such. Think of a herald saying "Here Ye, Here Ye." The herald has to be loud and clear, so people get the news, so they get the message and understand it. The same is true for the lector and his or her role. The lector should speak loudly and slowly and clearly, so everyone can hear and understand the Word of God.

A good lector also opens himself or herself up as a channel for the Word of God to reach people, so sometimes things come out differently at the ambo than they did when you were praying and practicing at home. That's the Spirit of God at work. You get to recognize it and embrace it.
