Today's Gospel: John 20: 19-31

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So, the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

Now a week later his disciples were again inside, and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now, Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

THIS WEEK IN JESUIT HISTORY: April 16 - 22

History: April 22, 1541. Once Ignatius had been elected as Superior eighteen days prior, the first Jesuits went to St. Paul Outside the Walls, to pronounce their solemn vows as members of the Society of Jesus, and to Ignatius as General. Soon they became known as Jesuits—those peculiarly associated with the name of Jesus—at first in a pejorative sense, but then more generally as an expression of esteem.

Saint: April 22 the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Society of Jesus. At all the key moments in the coming to life of the Society of Jesus, Mary was there: when Ignatius left his old life behind him, he made a vigil before the Black Madonna on the eve of the feast of the Annunciation in 1522; when he made his first vows, it was on the feast of the Assumption, 1534; and when he celebrated Mass for the first time, it was in the church of St Mary Major on Christmas Day, 1538. Seven months after the official approval of the Society by Pope Paul IV, Ignatius and his first five companions celebrated this new birth by making their vows together at our Lady's altar in the Basilica of St Paul Outside-the-Walls, on 22nd April 1541. Ignatius had been elected the superior general two weeks earlier and so it was he who presided at the Mass which those first Companions celebrated together. As Mary had helped bring Jesus to birth so she, too, helped bring to birth this community of brothers and priests who would be her Son's Companions.

The image of our Lady of the Way was in a small chapel where Ignatius often used to pray. It is a symbol not only of the Mother – the one who helps bring Jesus to life - but also of the Mother who accompanies her Son and His followers on their way, on our journey together, to the Father. Mary is there, journeying with us.

Ignatian Spirituality: Jesuit mathematicians had a significant impact on mathematics. According to one writer, "One cannot talk about mathematics in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries without seeing a Jesuit at every corner." Fabri, for example, worked on the problems of tides, optics, heliocentrism (whether the earth or the sun was the center of the universe), and tried to unify all of physics in a manner similar to geometry. Gregory Saint Vincent (1584-1667) developed polar coordinates, which are crucial to solving some types of math and physics problems. He was also important in developing analytic geometry. Ignatius-Gaston Pardies SJ investigated problems in a manner that later inspired Newton, and even questioned some of Newton's findings in a way that forced Newton to go back to clarify his thinking on some crucial points.

Voting will take place from May 6 to May 21 on the Parish website; paper ballots will also be available.


Minimum Qualifications for Elected Council Member

Persons wanting to arrange a baptism should call Christine Szczepanowski at the parish office at least two months before the desired date to arrange catechesis and the baptism celebration.

Anointing of the Sick

The anointing of the sick takes place during the 5:30 pm Vigil Mass on the first Saturday of each month.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Persons wanting to be married in the parish should call the front office at least nine months before the desired date.

Rite of Christian Initiation

Unbaptized adults who are considering baptism into the Catholic Church, baptized Catholics who have received no other sacraments and who want to be confirmed and to receive First Eucharist, and baptized non-Catholics who are considering full communion in the Catholic Church should call Christine Szczepanowski at the parish office.


