**Pentecost at the Pantheon:** Each year in Rome, on Pentecost Sunday, thousands of red rose petals, symbolizing the descent of the Holy Spirit, are dropped from the oculus, the circular opening in the center of the Pantheon's dome. The tradition is thought to have started around 609 AD. During the Mass, the petals are dropped by the Vigili del Fuoco (firefighters) of Rome as the choir chants the sequence for Pentecost Sunday, *Veni Sancte Spiritus*.

#### A Visitor's Experience of Old Saint Joseph's Easter Triduum

It was twilight when I arrived at Old St. Joseph's Church on Holy Thursday. As I walked across town to attend mass at Philadelphia's oldest Catholic church, I felt the fresh excitement of an early Spring evening. Although it seemed like the branches had just been bare, the trees were in full flower or they were sprouting new leaves. Rhododendrons, tulips and daffodils filled the flower beds, and the sidewalks bustled with pedestrians and festive dinner parties. As I neared the entrance of Old St. Joseph's, I felt reassured by the watercolor sky, suffused with pale pink and soft lilac, and how it seemed to confirm the call for celebration.

The mass on Holy Thursday invites us to place ourselves at the Last Supper -- the final meal that Jesus and His disciples shared before His crucifixion and death on Good Friday. It stood out to me that Jesus chose to be with his disciples that night, knowing all he would face the next day. It would have been a time of great personal anguish, and choosing to be present with his friends not only would have taken great courage, but it also illustrates how important the disciples were to Him. It demonstrated to me that loving relationships provide comfort, and communities are intended to be a source of support, even during the most difficult times.

By washing the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper, Jesus modeled the type of care He offers us and shows us how to care for others. We, too, were invited to have our feet washed during mass. The tenderness of the gesture and the richness in meaning stood out to me, perhaps more striking in a culture where people usually prefer more distance between one another. This tradition is a powerful reminder that although God can seem faraway, He is close. He already knows us well, and despite our messiness and imperfections, He still wants to be with us. He is even willing to be the one to extend the invitation, though whether we accept it or not is up to us.

Mass began in silence at 3:00 PM on Good Friday. It is difficult to contemplate the events of Good Friday — we see humanity at its absolute worst, and we're reminded of profound suffering and terrible injustice. We are confronted with the reality of death, and we may relive to

some degree the loneliness and grief we've experienced in our own lives. Yet, amazingly in response, Jesus brings great hope to these dark places and shows us the highest possible love. "There is no greater love than this, in laying down one's life for one's friends" (Jn 15:13).

Old St. Joseph's Church was cloaked in darkness at the start of the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening. All the lights were turned off, and the church was quiet, though it was filled with people. Fading twilight could be seen through the large windows behind the altar. In striking contrast, the celebrants gathered in the back of the church, around a bright fire. We each held a slim white candle. The priests lit the first candles, and the flame was passed from person to person until every candle was lit. Hundreds of small flames flickered around the church, like stars in the sky. The light dispelled the gloomy darkness and created a sense of community and shared identity.

Later during mass, once the lights were back on, three young adults were welcomed into the church as full members. A young man was baptized and clothed in a white garment, and two others were fully initiated. To conclude the evening, Easter cookies and sparkling apple cider were served in the courtyard after mass, before everyone headed home to prepare for Easter Sunday the next day.

Attending the Easter Triduum services created space for me to imagine the actual events that lead up to Easter Sunday -- envisioning the Last Supper, trying to imagine in a very small way what it could have been like to witness Jesus's crucifixion and death, and contemplating the questions and mysteries these events raise. The Easter Triduum fostered a deeper engagement with what these events mean and how they could inform and interact with my own life. The Easter Vigil recreated the still, quiet darkness of the tomb after Jesus's death. This darkness was broken by hundreds of small flames – a fire representing faith and hope, and a rekindling of new life – shared among everyone there that night.

Old St. Joseph's Welcomes Father Peter Clark, S.J. Special Presentation: "Decide for Yourself – A


